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# **Council news**

#### Two councillors join DTC

Council is complete after two new councillors were co-opted at the March Full Council meeting.



Annie Goulder, a former senior NHS manager working in large teaching hospitals in central London, spent the last 20 years working in capital investment including the re-development of University College Hospital. Diss became Annie's home in 2019 and she currently volunteers at Diss Citizens Advice.



Declan Craggs worked in health and social care for 10 years. He now co-owns a small accountancy practice with his wife and is Governor for Diss Infant School. Declan believes you must actively participate in your community if you want to continue to see Diss develop and thrive.

#### **MTA**

In April, Diss Town Council welcomed residents to its Annual Town Meeting (ATM), held at The Corn Hall. Chaired by the Town Mayor, Cllr Kieran Murphy, the event served as a platform for residents to engage with the Town, District and County Councils, find out more about projects in the town, voice their concerns and contribute ideas for the benefit of Diss.

Residents perused information stands set up by various local groups including the Diss Youth Group, Police, Parish Fields Friends, Park Radio, Royal British Legion, Designermakers 21, Diss United Reformed Church, Diss Litterpicking and Dovelets Group.

Attendees also heard about the Waveney & Little Ouse Recovery Project, led by Suffolk Wildlife Trust, which is looking at land use changes to help restore the headwater's hydrology, biodiversity and climate resilience between Diss and Thetford. It is hoped the project will deliver increases in river water quality and better access for residents to their local natural environment.

#### **Honoured Citizens 2024**

One of the highlights of the ATM was the presentation of our Honoured Citizen Awards, honouring individuals whose contributions are a shining example of community excellence. This year's awards went to Mary Cotton and Mike Garnham, both members of the Diss & District Royal British Legion branch, which celebrates its 100th anniversary this year.

Mary has raised thousands of pounds for their poppy appeal spending over 80 hours



in Morrisons and raising £6k this year alone. Mary also volunteers on the Legion stall at the Carnival and Armed Forces Day events and contributes to Remembrance Day planning and wreath laying. She is a member of the Waveney Choir, the Women's Institute, U3A and Royal Air Force Association and volunteers at Diss Museum.

Mike is the Legion's standard bearer, helps with Remembrance Day planning and looks after the wreaths by the war memorial. He works tirelessly at Quaker Wood both by himself when mowing the paths for much of the year and with young volunteer groups teaching them new skills. Mike also volunteers to maintain the boardwalk gardens.

#### **Beacon extension project**

Phase 2 of the town's Beacon of Hope partnership project is underway. The foundations have been dug and landscaping prepared for the installation of the paving, seating area and beacon plinth and panels. Funded in part by UKSPF from South Norfolk Council's Pride in Place Community Grant, this will create a fully accessible and additional tranquil seating area overlooking

the Mere where visitors can reflect on the town's history and recent events including

memories of the Queen's life and the King's Coronation. A unique material record will be contained within a time capsule buried in its base and the amenity will act as a key focal point for special occasions such as the 80th anniversary of D-day on 6th June. Pride in Place funding is part of the UK government's Shared Prosperity Fund.

# Diss URC - helping to support members of our local community



Community is at the heart of Diss United Reformed Church. We are fortunate enough to be located quite centrally in Diss on Mere Street, just opposite Aldi, which makes us a good place for community groups to meet. Some of the community groups are run independently from the church by people hiring one of our three rooms, but we also run quite a few ourselves.

Each Friday we hold our Welcome Cafe from 9.30am-12pm where anyone and everyone can drop in for a hot drink, one of our famous homemade cheese scones and a chat. Whilst once a month we hold our Dove Dementia Cafe, Dove Song, Dove Song Plus and Dove Cafe Church. The Dove Dementia cafe and Dove Song are primarily groups for people with a Dementia diagnosis and their carers. Whilst Dove Song Plus is a music therapy session for adults with complex needs and their carers. Dove Cafe Church is


a Dementia friendly service, but it is open to anyone who would like to come along.

But our exciting news is that we have started a new, weekly group called Dovelets! This is a community group for children aged 0-5 with additional or complex needs and their parents/carers which takes place each Tuesday from 10-11am. Once a month there is a music therapy session, but the remaining sessions involve sensory and messy play. We have lots of fun and we still have room for more children. # 80th anniversary of D-Day

Join families of veterans, local organisations, VIPs and members of the public at a special evening event in Diss Park on Thursday 6th June 2024 to mark the 80th anniversary of D-Day.



The town will fall silent at 9.15pm as local organisations and groups honour the sacrifice and service of men and women on D-Day in 1944, the largest naval, air and land operation in history.

Arrive at Diss Park before 8pm to see your local Cadet Forces and Scout Group parade into the park and carry out a short drill display. Compered by the Salvation Army, there will be a D-Day commemoration followed by the Last Post, a minute's silence and Reveille.

Two Diss High School students from Year 10 will share the poem for schools created especially for this occasion before Diss Churches Together lead us in prayer and a hymn.

One of our VIPs, a Deputy Lieutenant of Norfolk, will unveil the newly extended beacon, and a time capsule containing photos, newspaper articles and readings

from these events, condolences messages for our late Oueen, information on the beacon walking and cycling trails and much more will be installed during the event.

At 9.15pm and alongside many other communities in the UK, the Diss beacon will be lit, whilst the International Tribute commemorating D-Day and giving thanks for eighty years of peace and freedom - is read out.

This poignant event will conclude by 9.30pm with the national anthem.

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

# Diss Museum - a hub of history



Diss Museum has often been compared to Dr. Who's Tardis.

It may look small but you can spend hours in it, taking in the imaginative variety of displays.

This season, the main case features the history of the football club.

The display centres on the evolution of the colours and strip, the war years, famous players and the FA Vase success of 1994. Items include memorabilia loaned by former Diss, Ipswich and England striker Trevor Whymark.

In election year, there are wall panels tracing the history of the South Norfolk constituency, from its Conservative and Liberal days in the late 19th century, to the Labour victories in the 1920s and 1945, votes for women and the Conservative consolidation since the 1950s.

There will be a timeline of the life and work of Thomas Paine, from Thetford to Diss and on to Sussex, London, America and Paris before his return to the States.

The author of Rights of Man worked as a staymaker in Diss in the 1760s. The museum commemorated him in 2009, winning local, regional and national awards for the Tom Paine Festival.

New Acquisitions include: attic finds from Mount Street, a scary health remedy, Fair Green Post Office (not Horizon related!), Diss Shopping Week 1949, the Local Home Guard in WW2, Alma Electronics memories and domestic items. It will also feature Diss in 30 objects.

The Community Cabinet will display detectorist items, the Madgett Cycles centenary and also 100 years of the Royal British Legion.

Museum Manager Basil Abbott said; "Many Diss people have never set foot in the museum. Most of our visitors are from elsewhere; but the locals are missing so much that they would find fascinating about the town's past."

The museum has free admission and is open every day, except Sunday, from 11.00am to 3.00pm.

# **Disappearing Friends**

How would you feel if half your friends disappeared? This is what happened to Diss Museum. The museum's Friends are supporters whose regular contributions are essential to pay running costs. When the museum reopened after its long Covid break it became obvious that only half the original number of Friends had reappeared. Then the museum's finances suffered a second blow. Like other cultural organisations, we had relied on grants from local authorities. Spending cuts meant that this money is no longer available.

At present our income is not enough to cover our expenses. The museum showcases the town's heritage and belongs

to everyone, particularly to our children. It is not about to disappear. We do have some reserves, but these must be retained to cover large, unexpected costs, such as major building repairs, rather than be eaten up by every day running expenses.

Meanwhile, although we are determined to preserve the museum's quirky charm, we need better display cabinets and updated lighting. One of the pillars on the museum arcade is rotting and needs to be replaced, like for like. Go and look and you will see what we mean. We suspect the

other six pillars need major surgery too. It is up to the museum trustees to find new sources of income. But the people of Diss and the surrounding area can help with this too. We need to find more people to sign standing orders and replace those lost Friends. The annual cost of being a Friend is only £10 for an individual or £15 for family membership. This provides reduced entrance fees for our First Friday lectures, a newsletter and a ten per cent reduction in the shop. Residents who love the museum may consider leaving a legacy in the future.

We had great fun at Christmas, visiting the lights at Helmingham Hall and having an enjoyable Christmas meal to follow. We also supported the Trussell Trust by collecting food at Tesco just before Christmas and the Club presented the Trust with 20 slow cookers to distribute. We went out on four December evenings with Santa Claus and his reindeer and played Christmas music to entertain. People could track our route on their mobile phone and await our arrival. The Santa Claus collection raised about £2000 and will be used locally for Children's charities. Families in Diss were also helped by Rotary funds distributed by The Salvation Army and local schools.

Following suggestions from members of the public at our last Annual Meeting, Diss Town Council have formed an Action Group to implement a Green Corridor Network across Diss!



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


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# No. 8 Marketplace - A Real Community Space

# The History of Diss Town FC

In 1888 the cricket club had suggested forming a football club and a meeting took place at the Crown Hotel with Mr W Balls presiding, and it was decided to share the cricket ground at Roydon Road. However other local Diss teams were playing before this 1888 meeting, with The Diss Young Men's

Institute and the Diss Young Men's Friendly Society both fielding teams.



In 1892 the football club won their first trophy, the Norfolk Junior Cup, defeating Yarmouth 2nd XI 3-1 in the final after a goalless draw. Here

we show a winner's medal from the final. The first record of a Diss Town match in the local newspaper reports on an away match



on Saturday December 15th 1888 against Beccles 2nd XI which ended 2-2, despite Diss playing with only ten men. Below, we show the earliest known photograph of the Diss team. The team from 1895/96 line up outside the old Roydon Road pavilion. Back row; MW Ireland, A Pearce, GT Williams, RA

In 1906/07 Diss joined the Norwich & District League and played Ipswich Town (then a Southern Amateur League side) in the F.A Amateur Cup in 1929/30 and 1931/32. Losing 4-2 at Ipswich, but drawing 3-3 at Ipswich two years later before losing 4-2 again in the replay which was actually played back at Ipswich a week later.



The club celebrated its Jubilee on April 5th 1949 and a match was played against a Norwich City XI side (see image of programme). This included Manchester City goalkeeper Alec Thurlow, a local lad who had played for the Diss Tuesday side before eventually signing for Manchester City in 1947. In 1935/36 Diss Town moved up to the Norfolk & Suffolk League and were runnersup in 1955-56. By now they had adopted the new tangerine kit changing from their old black and white quartered shirts.

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The colours were put forward as a suggestion by The Diss Express to follow Blackpool who had recently won the FA Cup in 1953.

They won the League Cup in 1956/57, and again in 1960/61. In 1964 the club joined the Anglian Combination, winning Division One in 1967/68 and the League Cup, and were Champions again in 1973/74. In 1975 Diss won the Norfolk

Senior Cup beating

St Andrews 3-2 at Carrow Road and were also Premier Division runners-up. In 1975/76 they finished as league runners up again and also won the League Cup. They also won the Premier Division in 1976/77 and again in 1978/79 and the League Cup in 1979/80 and 1981/82.

In 1983 Diss moved to Brewers Green Lane. and in 1988/89 became founder members of Division One of the Jewson League (Eastern Counties League). Winning the Division One title in 1991/92, they also returned to Carrow Road for the Norfolk Senior Cup Final against Fakenham drawing 2-2 before losing 2-1 in the replay. The club's reserve team also played at Carrow Road in that same season, winning the Norfolk Junior Cup (100 years after the first team had first won it). Manager Bill Punton, below, then led the club to its greatest triumph in 1993/94 winning

the FA Vase in front of 13,450 at Wembley over Taunton Town 2-1



after extra time. In 1995/96 they finished as runners-up in the Premier Division and won the Norfolk Senior Cup beating Wroxham 4-0. They won the cup again in 2002/03 defeating Gt Yarmouth 4-1 before losing to Wroxham in the 2003/04

season but beating them 3-0 in the 2004/05 final.

An exhibition of memorabilia of Diss Town and ex-Diss Town player Trevor Whymark who later joined Ipswich Town, is currently on display at Diss Museum.

Whilst it may seem in winter that the wood is dormant and waiting for spring, our volunteers have been hard at work with various projects across the site. One such project has been our dead hedging, seen along the Western edge of The Wood.

other traditional techniques in their woodland management plan. As we head from spring into summer we will begin scything again, with training opportunities available to anyone who is interested in volunteering with us or learning more.



of the main stem of the plant to be able to lay the main stem down along the course of the hedge (this is called making a pleach or pleacher). Once the hedge is laid you plant stakes along the hedge-line and weave them all together using long stems of hazel, gathered from hazels nearby that have

been coppiced for wood production. There is a unique hedge laying style for almost every region in the UK!

My father was John Arthur Rogers, born in Forty Acre Lane, Canning Town, in May 1924.

Two weeks after his 20th birthday, my Dad stormed the beaches of Normandy to free Europe from the yoke of Nazi rule! He did not do this on his own, a couple of his mates came with him and a few other lads from around the world, plus some friendly Americans he met on the way. He sadly left some of them forever on the Battlefields of Europe.

My dad had been in the local Home Guard, and in January 1943, he was called up. After his basic training he joined the Royal Engineers, where in 1943 he became a driver. On D-Day he was a member of 962 Company Royal Engineers. He was due on Gold Beach (sub-section Jig Beach) on D-Day, but owing to a delay clearing the beach, he disembarked early on the 7th June.

His job was to help to construct the Mulberry Harbour (B) (British). Once the harbour was established, he moved inland. The first main town they came to was Bayeux, and then on to Cean. He then fought his way through France, Belgium and Holland, then finally into Germany. His main job was to help to build Bailey Bridges, which he did many of along the way.

Even when peace was declared, the war was not over for him, and he was finally discharged in June 1947 at York.

Dad spent most of his working life with local companies in east London and was working for Newham Council when he passed away in November 1986 at the age of 62 after suffering a heart attack.
















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### Fair Green Brocante
