#### INF1122/04 MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING

#### INF1122/06 ITEMS OF URGENT BUSINESS

There was none.

#### INF1122/07 STRATEGIC PLAN

a) Members considered report reference 32/2223 regarding recommendations following the trial of the street sweeper and water bowser. There were questions regarding the possibility of trialling the billy goat via hire rather than purchasing. Several councillors were familiar with the proposed billy goats and commented that they are easy to use at a fraction of the cost of the Max Vac. It was suggested that a supplier in Norwich should be approached regarding second hand options and recommended that the option of using Aspen 4 stroke to fuel the equipment would be a more environmentally friendly option and can extend the lifetime of the engine particularly given electric vehicles are not planned for 5 years. Members also queried the equipment used for cleaning the streets. It was

#### RESOLVED:

- 1. To stop hiring the Max Vax Sweeper and water bowser with immediate effect.
- 2. To purchase another van at a specification to accommodate the proposed water pump system up to the value of £15k allocated to Earmarked Reserves Street Cleaner.
- 3. To purchase a fuel-based generator water pump system with low- and high-pressure units at a cost of up to £5k excl. VAT allocated to EMR Street Cleaner.
- 4. To install the water pump system in the van at a cost of £1k allocated to EMR Street Cleaner.
- 5. To purchase or rent a petrol operated commercial billy goat hoover / cleaner at a cost of £3.5k allocated to EMR Street Cleaner.

b) Members noted update on the Diss & District Neighbourhood Plan. The examiner will be appointed by the end of November with the aim to start in the New Year with a referendum estimated to take place in March. The timescales will depend on examiner queries. Thanks were extended to councillors Taylor and Olander for their considerable input into this lengthy and complex project.

#### INF1122/08 PEDESTRIANISATION OF MERE STREET

Members received an update regarding the Mere Street pedestrianisation project. It was noted that a meeting with Norfolk County Council is awaited for a fuller explanation but that the project no longer has the support of the County Councillor and therefore will not be proceeding.

Members considered the signage proposals. There was a request to add 'cyclists' dismount' signs under the 'No entry' sign at the Chapel / Mere St junction towards Market Place and from the Mavery House end of Mere St towards Market Place. It was also suggested that an information day to publicise the no cycling in Mere St be organised with leaflets to explain the new signage and a police / media presence. Consideration would be given to other elements of the scheme to benefit the town centre given the Town Council has funding.

#### INF1122/09 PARISH PARTNERSHIP BID

Members received a report regarding Parish Partnership Bid projects for 2022-2023 (reference 33/2223 referred). There was discussion regarding voice activated speed signs in Suffolk to tackle vehicle noise pollution but that the existing SAM signs are to deter speeding. It was noted that not all electric vehicle charging points are standardised so this would be considered as part of the feasibility study and that the Diss Youth & Community Centre would be a good location given its home to the litter picking group, community fridge and composter. It was

#### RESOLVED:

- 1. Not to submit a Parish Partnership Bid application for 2023-24 but consider using Earmarked Reserves and / or Community Infrastructure Levy funds to improve walking and cycling infrastructure once a feasibility study has been undertaken.
- 2. To appoint an action group of councillors Olander, Welch & Wooddissee to work with the Clerk to investigate the feasibility of installing electric vehicle charging points at Town Council owned sites.

#### INF1122/10 RESIDENTS PARKING SCHEME

Members received an update regarding the residents parking scheme. It was noted that parking in the Triangle is still a significant issue, that this has been added to this scheme including consideration of the limited and unclear signage. There is an issue with parking opposite the Saracens Head car park which might be addressed with 'do not park here' signage from Market Place to Mount St and not only in the opposite direction.

Two points for inclusion were requesting regular police presence at Town Council meetings the effectiveness of CCTV.

There was a request to increase the number of Infrastructure committee meetings. It was noted that due to postponement of an earlier meeting, there had been a longer gap than usual and that an even spread would be presented in the draft Schedule of Meetings for next year. Members were reminded that projects can be pushed forward in-between meetings and that there is some overlap with other committees for inclusion on their agendas where appropriate and if decisions are required sooner than the next meeting date. The Town Council is primarily reliant on higher tier authorities given they have the powers to act in most infrastructure related projects.

Cllrs Collins & Sinfield advised that they are sourcing funding to produce a 'Welcome to Diss' leaflet and it was noted that the bench will be replaced outside Diss Publishing in due course.

#### Introduction

- At the last meeting of this committee members considered a report (reference 34/2223)
  regarding part-night lighting proposals. It was resolved (minute reference INF1122/12)
  that the Chair and councillor Sinfield works with the Clerk to determine Council owned
  streetlights which should be kept on for safety reasons with proposals for the switching
  times to be included.
- 2. Cllrs Olander, Sinfield & Taylor met with the Clerk on 18<sup>th</sup> January to review locations of all lights in relation to the proposal to switch off some of the lights during the night to save on electricity costs and benefit the environment.

#### Proposal

- 3. Of the 229 lights owned by the Town Council, it is proposed to part-night light 119 of them i.e. 52% (see Appendix A).
- 4. The proposal is based on highways safety and therefore it is proposed to retain the night lighting on town centre streets such as Mere St and main through roads such as Roydon Road as well as those lights on footways connecting developments. These were the same principles used by the District Council prior to transfer of ownership when they carried out their needs assessment in 2018 (Appendix B).
- 5. The proposal also supports the energy efficiency / carbon footprint reduction aims of the Town Council and nationally as well as the darker skies policy of the Diss & District Neighbourhood Plan.
- 6. The Action Group also considered the switching times following discussion at the last meeting that Suffolk County Council's policy to switch off from 23.30 to 06.00 was too early.
- 7. Taking account of the public transport schedules and extension to licensing hours, it is proposed that the lights are switched off at 1am and back on again at 5.30am.
- 8. There are 6 comments in the Notes column, which will be reviewed prior to implementation.

#### Savings

9. An update on the cost and carbon savings from this part-night lighting proposal will be requested from SCC.

#### Recommendation


To switch off 119 streetlights owned by Diss Town Council as per Appendix A between 1am and 5.30am with immediate effect and publicise the cost and carbon savings made.










# Footway Lights in the Provisional Assessment – Diss (Map 1)

Subject:	Land purchase – Denmark Lane

#### Introduction

- 1. Councillor Waterman has identified a small triangle of land on Denmark Lane (as marked on Appendix A), which the owner is prepared to sell.
- 2. Further details about the land, correspondence with the landowner and proposals for the use of the land can be viewed at Appendix B.
- 3. The landowner purchased the land for £25k and would sell for £10k to Diss Town Council.
- 4. The proposal is to purchase the site, clear the rubbish and cut back rogue vegetation, excavate the Blacker Bombard (a form of Home-Guard defence) and place an information board by it so that it becomes a community green space. It is also suggested that it is managed as such by a group of Trustees, similar in nature and operation to Quaker Wood and its Steering Group.

#### Powers

5. The powers of local councils to acquire land by agreement or gift are largely contained in section 124 of the Local Government Act 1972, which states that for the purposes of the benefit, improvement or development of their area, a parish or community council may acquire by agreement any land, whether situated inside or outside their area.

#### Community Infrastructure Levy

6. The Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL), a charge which can be levied by local authorities on new development in their area, is an important tool for local authorities to use to help them deliver the infrastructure needed to support development in their

area.

- 7. Town, parish and community councils share of any Community Infrastructure Levy CIL) receipts can be spent on a wide range of things including:
  - a) the provision, improvement, replacement, operation or maintenance of infrastructure; or
  - b) anything else that is concerned with addressing the demands that development places on an area.


It should be noted that "Infrastructure" includes physical, social and green infrastructure e.g., Highways; cycleways; education facilities; sports and community halls; parks and play areas.

#### **Budget**

- 8. Diss Town Council currently has £68,408 of CIL Funds in its Earmarked Reserves as at 31st December 2022.
- 9. It is proposed that this committee recommends to Full Council expenditure of £10k from CIL funds to purchase this land appointing a firm of qualified chartered surveyors or valuers to carry out the necessary conveyancing work on its behalf.
- 10. Where land is purchased by agreement, it is common practice for each party to bear their own legal costs in respect of the conveyancing and transfer. However, it sometimes occurs that one of the parties may require the other to pay all legal costs, as a precondition of his/her agreement to a sale or purchase.

#### Recommendation

To recommend to Full Council the purchase of the small triangle of land on Denmark Lane (marked by a cross on Appendix A) from the landowner for £10k allocated to Earmarked Reserves CIL with associated additional costs relating to conveyancing to be considered at a future Council meeting.

# George's Thoughts 15/1/23 - Bombarded with Possibility

This is a relatively short edition of George's Thoughts, following a chain of events that started back in about June last year. I'll summarise it all now for those of you who may not know what's been going on:

On the June litterpick last year I was picking through a piece of land to the west of Taylor Rd, coming off of Denmark Lane. It is a small triangle of land with some mature trees, numerous brambles and shrubs, a fence along one side and plenty of flytipped rubbish. While clearing the northern end of the site I came across a large concrete circle with a silver coloured metal spigot poking out the top of it. I mentioned this discovery to volunteers at Quaker Wood the following month in July, where one of them informed me that what I found was probably the mounting point of the old Home-Guard Blacker Bombard.

Blacker Bombards were a form of Home-Guard defence that were spread across the country in case of German invasion during WW2. They are essentially mobile machine guns, with the bit I discovered being the spigot that the gun would have sat on. The gun would have been trained up the old Roydon High Road had there been a battle. It's likely that the bit that's visible right now is just the top of the whole surviving Bombard structure, which should be a dugout in the ground with room for sandbags and a few Home-Guard soldiers.

Since my discovery I have joined Diss Town Council. During my two week break from work over Christmas, I asked Sarah our Clerk if she could help me determine who the landowner of the site was where the Bombard is located. I was hopeful that the landowner may agree to some volunteers tidying the site up, exposing the Bombard and perhaps placing an information board there to explain what the Bombard is.

Sarah managed to discover that the owner of the site was a Mr Richard Day. With this knowledge I wrote him a letter with a Diss Town Council heading and sent it to his address. The letter contained an explanation of who I am and what I'd like to see happen on his

land. A few weeks passed and Mr Day got in contact with me via email. He explained that he helped develop the affordable homes adjacent to the site and purchased his bit of land off of the original developers for £25,000. He intended to develop the site with some innovative affordable housing himself, but ill health has prevented him from doing this.

Mr Day has explained that he had intended to auction the site soon for the price that he had paid for it, but in light of my letter to him has offered to sell the land to 'our organisation' for the incredibly generous price of £10,000, taking a £15,000 loss on his investment but still securing some money for his family.

This is the entire situation so far. It is clear that the Council needs to have a discussion and come to an agreement on this issue with considerable speed, as this whole situation presents some incredible opportunities for the town.

Suggestions have been made about reviving efforts to develop the site, but given the number of large mature trees there and the historic value of the Blacker Bombard, I would like to make some ideas of my own clear to you all, before we meet to discuss next steps.

The field west of the site will inevitably see development, completely surrounding the site with housing. It is a difficult shape to work with from a development point of view, covered in habitat for wildlife and has significant historical value. In my opinion the Council should work to purchase the site, clear the rubbish on there and cut back rogue vegetation. It should then excavate the Blacker Bombard and place an information board by it. The Council should then create a group of trustees for the site to oversee and manage it as a community green space, similar in nature and operation to Quaker Wood and its Steering Group.

The site would be relatively easy to manage as semi-wild habitat to the south, and more curated green space to the North where the Bombard is located. The site would serve as a kind of 'pocket park', acting as a green lung between the Taylor Rd Estate to the east, Long Meadow Drive to the north and the new development when it is built to the west. It is the least the Council can do to provide green space to current and future residents on that side of town.

Anyway, this is the whole situation, my thoughts included, so I'm keen to hear what everyone else has to say!

#### Introduction

1. £5k of National Lottery funding has been earmarked for expenditure on extending the beacon in Diss Park (EMR Park General – Beacon Project).

#### Specification of works

- 2. Anglia Stone Ltd were appointed to draft a specification of works in order that comparative quotes can be sourced (Appendix A).
- 3. The specification recommends that the groundworks are carried out up to 8 weeks in advance of phase 2 to install the panels, paving and seating to allow the ground to settle.

#### Timescales

- 4. It was originally intended to have the unveiling of the extended beacon and lighting ceremony as part of the King's Coronation event. However, the late Queen's Pageant master, who has been managing major events for more than 30 years, has recently announced that beacons will not be lit in celebration as they would like these events to have a markedly different look to those of June 2022 (Appendix B).
- 5. Having said this, the National Lottery funding granted to the Town Council should usually be spent within one year of the award which is 31<sup>st</sup> March 2023. The funding bid timescales did assume receipt of the funds up to 12 weeks after application and in advance of the June event, which should provide some leeway.

#### Quotation

- 6. Given the timescales above, a quotation has been received from Anglia Stone Ltd for the landscaping and foundation works to support the Beacon extension project (Appendix C).
- 7. It is therefore recommended that committee appoints Anglia Stone Ltd to carry out the phase 1 works to ensure this proportion of the funds are spent before the financial year end.

#### Remaining (EMR) funds

8. The Clerk will liaise with the National Lottery Fund to request an extension to expenditure of the remaining £3k to ensure the project can be completed.

9. It is estimated that additional funds will be required and an application to the Diss Surveyor's Allotment Charity will be submitted in due course.

#### **Event**

10. It is envisaged that a separate event will be planned to unveil the beacon and light it at an appropriate time later in the year.

For Beacon / King's Coronation event working group members ...

- 11. Since approving the event date of Saturday 6<sup>th</sup> May, Buckingham Palace has announced further details on the ceremonial, celebratory and community events that will take place over the Coronation Weekend between Saturday 6<sup>th</sup> and Monday 8<sup>th</sup> May 2023 (Appendix D).
- 12. It is suggested that community events should be on the Sunday to give everyone a chance to see what is being televised. This includes the many volunteers who will be required to give up the opportunity to be with friends and family to set up the originally proposed event from approximately midday on the Saturday.
- 13. It is therefore proposed that we change the date of the event from the Saturday to the Sunday, possibly starting earlier in the afternoon given the time of year / potential weather conditions, remove the beacon ceremony aspect of the event and update the content for the monthly column in the Diss Express accordingly.

#### Recommendations

- 1. To appoint Anglia Stone Ltd to carry out the landscaping and foundation works as per quotation received to support the Beacon extension project.
- 2. To agree a date of Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> May 2023 for the King's Coronation celebration event.





Proposed commemorative surround and seating area for the existing beacon located in the Park, Diss






#### Site Description:

The site of the existing beacon has been surveyed and the fall in 4M is typically 400mm towards the mere. To ensure that the paved area is flat with a slight fall to accommodate drainage, landscaping will be required, ideally in early March so that the turf will be able to recover to allow public footfall.

**Description of Work –** A method statement and health and safety risk assessment will be provided before work commences.

Erect Heras Fencing, Remove turf and set aside, supply and install wood hexagonal form work and landscape the area around 1m beyond the formwork. **Practical note**: The final result will require a gentle slope of 250mm in 1 m at the east (mere) part.

Excavate foundation and dispose of surplus soil to a licensed landfill site.






